

Developing Effective Communication Skills in Children

Communication is an important process in everyone's life. Without communication, humans will cease to exist. Efficient communication is a mandatory to express one's mind to the other and an important part of any relationship. Communication occurs in many forms; it could be verbal or it could even be non-verbal. Non-verbal communication may include facial expressions, body dynamics, utter silence or even meaningless blabber. Young children's understanding of language and conversation is remarkably different from those of older children. Children should be helped to master the art of efficient communication, both verbal and non-verbal.

Some children feel awkward or shy, when speaking in public, because of an air of uncertainty in expressing their feelings. Young children learn the art of communication gradually over the years, as they develop the basic skills of language, dialect, diction and vocabulary. Having effective communication skills means more than just knowing how to talk. Children often need guidance in learning how to interact with others when speaking, writing and using electronic forms of communication. Using role-playing to teach children how to communicate with peers and adults is fun and an engaging way for kids to learn.

Active Listening: Children need to understand the importance and develop the skills of listening to others, while also teaching her that it is OK to ask questions if they need clarification. Teach children, in the simplest terms, how active communication works. Practice role-playing with a child to help her learn proper ways to address adults. Discuss words that are off-limits and let the child know that these words are unacceptable in the home and elsewhere. With younger children, play games like the telephone game or start a story and have your child finish it.



Nonverbal Communication Skills: Talk to children about nonverbal communication and discuss the importance of posture and body language. Practice different types of body language with children so they can understand how they affect others' perception of their message. Use simple terms such as "When you stand with your arms crossed, the listener might think you are angry or frustrated even if you are not." Practicing through role-playing or games will help children develop effective communication skills that will carry them into adulthood.

Tone of Voice: Discuss the importance of using appropriate tones when speaking. Try to reinforce that yelling and arguing may not be the best way to communicate with other children. Be mindful of your own tone of voice when talking with a child.

Electronic Communication: Teach your child how to communicate virtually once you think she is old enough for it. Discuss the importance of Internet safety and make sure she knows to avoid chatting or messaging with strangers. Have a younger child practice sending emails through your email account until he is old enough to have his own. Emphasize how communication can be misconstrued when communicating virtually and discuss the importance of thinking about the wording of messages before clicking the "Send" button.



Writing Skills: Have your child spend time creating free drawings and writing letters with a purpose. A great place to start is to have her send thank-you notes for gifts received. Purchase small postcards for your child to write short notes to family members who live in other cities. Young children can be just asked to represent through drawings what they would like to convey in the letter. You can then label their drawings based on what they want to convey.

Dear Parents,

Once, six years old Abhi, told his teacher that he saw a man as tall as the Qutab Minar. The teacher did not argue with Abhi's perception. She was not in a hurry to point out that no man can be so big. She neither did interrupt the child's imagination by saying, "Stop lying, stop telling tall tales." Instead she acknowledged his perception with empathy and humor and she asked the following questions.

"You saw a tall man? A big man? Was he looking gigantic and tremendous?" To each of these, Abhi answered, "Yes." Her lesson was good in human relationship and in terms of the vocabulary that she used. To reach a child's mind the adult, must capture his heart. Only if a child feels right can he think right. What counts most in adult child communication is the quality of the process. Our statements affect the child's self esteem and self worth. Effective / congruent communication can transform education. It strikes not just at the trappings of teaching but at the heart of learning.




First week of the new 2011-12 academic session
