Classroom Insights

EYP 1

During the **'Transition'** phase the toddlers find themselves amidst new experiences, new faces and new environment. It's time when children learn to get acquainted to a structured learning environment, deal with separation anxiety and bond with teachers and peers. In an effort to make this transition as smooth as possible the sessions were planned with thought and care. During outdoor free play session a bowling alley, hula hoops, ball pool and scoopers were placed which children eagerly explored. They also got an opportunity to know their peers. Music and movement sessions became lively with peppy songs and rhymes played on the music system and the music helped them to calm down. Story narration with puppets and enactments by teachers awed children. It was a pleasure to see children gradually learn to play with peers, to eat meals together and get familiar with the school environment.





Many adults dread laundry, but young children love it! This was observed during the theme on **'Clothes'**. Water play and washing clothes was an activity which children thoroughly enjoyed. A wet and dry area in the dolls corner was created with day to day materials like, thick string for hanging clothes, clothes clips, buckets, tub filled with water, brushes, soap cases and small cloth pieces. Children dipped the cloth pieces in water, squeezed and flapped before hanging them on the string. Through this activity children experienced washing clothes which beside being an enjoyable messy play experience was also a physical and socioemotional activity.

During the theme of 'Movements' the pretend play corner was turned into a garage where small tyres, tubes, tools, broken toy vehicles, dusters, buckets and pipes were placed for children to pretend play. Children utilized all the materials placed to repair, wash and clean vehicles. This led to enhanced language development, social skills, sparked creativity and allowed self-expression.



EYP 2



To make the **'Transition'** from EYP1 to EYP 2 comfortable for the children, carefully planned activities were thought of. It was not just moving to another class but meeting new teachers and friends. Circle time activities were mostly about their likes, their family and their favourite things. They enjoyed knowing each other's names through the 'Hickety Pickety' rhyme. Free drawing and free play gave them an opportunity to express their creativity in different ways.

Creating an organized and inviting space where children can count, compare, sort and build a strong number sense foundation using 3-D objects goes a long way in their understanding of **'Mathematical concepts'**. This opportunity is provided on the Math Table which forms a part of the Indoor Free Play. Children sorted yellow and red colour circle shape objects and matched it to the respective colour sheets with circle drawn on it. They counted pebbles placed on the table and tried to match it with similar number of circles drawn on a sheet. When the math center is made with inviting and intriguing materials, children start building critical math skills without even realizing that they're doing anything other than having fun!





During the project on **'Fruits'** not only did children explore various fruits and fruit products by touching, smelling and tasting (edible fruit products) but also had an hands on experience of making juice and shrikhand from them. They brought fruits like sweet lime, mango and apple from home, mostly fruit of their choice. They squeezed sweet lime and mango to extract its juice and pulp respectively. It was an excellent fine motor activity besides the thrill of seeing the outcome. They then mixed mango pulp and sugar to hung curd underthe supervision of teachers and then prepared shrikand and tasted it too.

Junior KG

The 'Transition' to kindergarten was an accommodation to extended time, new teachers and new routine. Activities aimed at helping them to know peers, enhance listening skills through games and get accustomed to the new environment. When children are aware what is expected from them it helps them to become disciplined. A set of class rules were decided on mutual agreement along with the help of the teacher during the first week of the session.

> The life of young children revolves around their families, and they learn the importance of relationships through their family members. The theme on 'My Family' gave the children an opportunity to understand the concept of joint family and nuclear family through an activity of making a family tree and discussing the different members. Later children made a pictograph using the data of joint family and nuclear family.

The first project of the academic year was 'Plants' where the children were involved in an in-depth investigation of the topic. Discussions helped them to think critically and pose different questions which resulted in building new vocabulary. To encourage them to explore plants on their own, a miniature garden was created in a sand tray with different plants with and without flowers, trees, grass, pebbles, blue gelatin paper as pond, and few animals. Children during indoor free play played with this in creative ways.

Senior KG

'Transition' - The new session began with welcoming many new friends and children being involved in team games. It was a time to know different people of the school who ensure their safety and well being. Children met all the caretakers of the school which included the security, cook, peon and admin staff. They visited them at their work stations and interacted with them to know about their work. They enjoyed interacting and interviewing the Principal.

> During the theme of 'My Body', as a part of the Readiness session children were asked to observe their shoes carefully. They were encouraged to share about their findings which ranged from the brand, the numbers and the realization that the numbers (size) varied. After this discussion they formed groups according to their shoe size. With this available data, children then were guided to make a pictograph to represent it. An exposure to collecting data, analyzing it and then representing it lays the foundation of handling data in day to day situations.

'Clothes' theme is a great topic to explore with the children at any time of the year. It offers a versatile range of learning skills. Accessories on clothes was covered through a show and tell activity. Children were asked to wear the clothes with accessories on it. Each child came in front of the group and described the accessories on his/her clothes. This activity enhanced their knowledge about accessories, improved their confidence and helped them with their listening and speaking skills. Being the centre of attention for a couple of minutes made them feel special and important which was evident on their faces and body language.
















Celebrations

EYP1

EYP2

They not only selected their work for display but also shared their learning with their peers in the form of anecdotes, drawings and clay models. It was fun for children to visit other classes and see what they had made and interacted with them.

Ways to Empower Your Child Against Bullying

What is bullying? "Bullying" is defined as unwanted, aggressive behavior in which a child or teen uses a real or perceived power imbalance, such as physical strength, access to embarrassing information, or popularity, to control or harm other kids. It can include anything from spreading rumors to name-calling to physical aggression. Essentially, Bullying is an abuse of power.

Bullying behavior begins in preschool and gains momentum as kids grow. A survey shows that between 40 and 80 percent of middle schoolers admit to participating in bullying behavior. Many kids describe themselves as having been subjected to bullying but also as having bullied others. Recent research shows that long-term consequences of bullying include higher risk for depression, anxiety, PTSD, substance abuse and self-destructive behavior.

The good news is that you can help your child develop the skills to stand up to bullying behavior, and you can keep him from becoming a bully. How?

1. Model compassionate, respectful relationships from the time your child is small.

The most effective way to keep children from being bullied, and from becoming bullies, is to make sure they grow up in loving, respectful relationships, rather than relationships that use power or force to control them.

2. Stay connected to your child through thick and thin.

Lonely kids are more likely to be bullied. And kids are often ashamed that they're being bullied, so they worry about telling their parents. Remember, parenting is 80% connection -- a close relationship with your child -- and only 20% guidance. So prioritize your relationship with your child, and keep those lines of communication open, no matter what.

3. Model confident behavior with other people.

If you tend to back down easily so you don't make a scene, but then later feel pushed-around, it's time to change that. Your child is learning from watching you. Experiment with finding ways to assert your own needs or rights while maintaining respect for the other person.

4. Directly teach your child respectful self-assertion.

Kids need to know they can get their needs met while being respectful of other people. Give him words to stick up for himself early on:

"It's my turn now." "Hey, stop that." "Hands off my body."

"It's not okay to hurt." "I don't like being called that. I want you to call me by my name."

5. Teach your child basic social skills.

Unfortunately, bullies prey on kids whom they perceive to be vulnerable. If you have a child who has social-skill challenges, make it a priority to support your child to make him less attractive to bullies. Kids who are successful in joining groups of kids usually observe first, and find a way to fit into the group, rather than just barging in.

6. Teach your child that there is no shame in being frightened by a bully, in walking away, or in telling an adult and asking for help.

Bullying situations can escalate, and saving face is less important than saving their life.

7. Teach kids to intervene to prevent bullying when they see it.

Bullying expert Michele Borba says that when bystanders -- kids who are nearby -- intervene correctly, studies find they can stop bullying more than half the time and within 10 seconds.

8. Teach your child basic bully avoidance.


Bullies operate where adults aren't present, so if your child has been bullied, she should avoid unsupervised hallways, bathrooms, and areas of the playground.

9. Don't hesitate to intervene.

Your job as the parent is to protect your child. That means that in addition to teaching your child to stick up for herself, you may well need to call the teacher or principal. Don't give your child the message that she's all alone to handle this.


