YEARLY LEARNING OUTCOMES FOR ENGLISH, 2020-21

By the end of the year, students should be able to:

E1 LISTENING AND SPEAKING

- E1.1 Recall and discuss important features to talk about
- E1.2 Ask questions to develop ideas and extend understanding
- E1.3 Report back to a group, using notes and present findings about a topic studied
- E1.4 Prepare and present an argument to persuade others to a point of view
- E1.5 Talk confidently and listen purposefully in a range of contexts
- E1.6 Describe events and convey opinions with increasing clarity
- E1.7 Shape and organise ideas clearly when speaking.
- E1.8 Develop confidence in performing (e.g. a play, a poem etc.)

E2 PHONICS SPELLING AND VOCABULARY

- E2.1 Recognise common letter strings in words pronounced differently.
- E2.2 Use dictionaries efficiently and carry out IT spell checks
- E2.3 Collect synonyms and opposites and investigate shades of meaning.
- E2.4 Use a thesaurus to extend vocabulary and the choice of words.
- E2.5 Investigate ways of creating opposites (e.g. 'un', 'im') and comparatives (e.g. 'er', 'est')
- E2.6 Use effective strategies for learning new spellings and mis-spelt words
- E2.7 Use known spellings to work out the spelling of related words
- E2.8 Investigate spelling patterns for pluralisation (e.g. s, -es, -y/ies, -f/ves)
- E2.9 Investigate the meaning and spelling of common prefixes (e.g. auto-, bi-, trans-)
- E2.10 Identify unstressed vowels in polysyllabic words (e.g. carpet, interest)
- E2.11 Identify unfamiliar words, explore definitions and use new words in context.
- E2.12 Learn spelling rules for words ending in 'e' and 'y' (e.g. take/taking, try/tries)
- E2.13 Spell and use possessive pronouns correctly (e.g. their, theirs, my, mine)
- E2.14 Investigate the origin and appropriate use of idiomatic phrases.
- E2.15 Discuss metaphorical expressions and figures of speech
- E2.16 Investigate patterns in the use of single and double consonants (e.g. full / ful)
- E2.17 Extend understanding of the use of adverbs to qualify verbs (e.g. in a dialogue)

E3 GRAMMAR AND PUNCTUATION

- E3.1 Practise proof reading and editing writing for clarity and correctness.
- E3.2 Understand conventions of Standard English
- E3.3 Place full stops correctly at the end of complex sentences.
- E3.4 Use a wider range of adjectives (qualitative, interrogative, emphasizing) and adverbs (degree, frequency, interrogative, reason, affirmation and negation) to add details
- E3.5 Identify prepositions and use the term.
- E3.6 Use pronouns (including possessive and reflexive pronouns) making clear to what or to whom they refer
- E3.7 Understand the difference between direct and reported speech
- E3.8 Learn how dialogue is set out and punctuated
- E3.9 Learn to differentiate between Active and passive voice and use them appropriately
- E3.10 Understand different phrases and clauses in a sentence with their classification
- E3.11 Learn to identify subject verb agreement accurately and use it accurately

E3.12 Use tenses accurately in narratives spanning several time frames

E4 READING

- E4.1 Read widely and explore the features of different genres (poetry, fiction & non-fiction).
- E4.2 Locate information confidently and efficiently from different sources
- E4.3 Skim-read to gain overall sense of a text and scan for specific information
- E4.4 Develop note taking to extract key points and to group and link ideas
- E4.5 Identify the point of view from which a story is told
- E4.6 Read and evaluate non-fiction texts for purpose, style, clarity and organization
- E4.7 Look for information in non-fiction texts to build on what is already known
- E4.8 Explore the features of texts which recount events and experiences (e.g. diaries)
- E4.9 Analyse openings and compare the structure of different stories
- E4.10 Consider how characters are presented, and their different perspectives
- E4.11 Read and identify characteristics of myths, legends and fables
- E4.12 Read narrative poems and perform/read aloud poems in a variety of ways

- E5.1 Review, revise and edit writing in order to improve it, using IT as appropriate
- E5.2 Choose words and phrases carefully to convey feeling and atmosphere
- E5.3 Map out writing to plan structure of the response (e.g. paragraphs, sections and chapters)
- E5.4 Describe events and convey opinions with increasing clarity
- E5.5 Record ideas, reflections and predictions about books (e.g. in a reading log)
- E5.6 Write new scenes or characters into a story, or write from another view point
- E5.7 Write own versions of poems, legends, myths and fables using structures from reading
- E5.8 Make notes for different purposes using simple abbreviations
